## **College Art Association: What Is It?**

During my first year in graduate school, a professor in my program held an advisory session for new students. She encouraged all of us to join the College Art Association (CAA) and to maintain that membership in the years to come. I took her advice and have never regretted it. I've recently been appointed as the liaison between WCA and CAA and in the coming months, I'll be contributing short pieces to the WCA E-News about the benefits of CAA and the various reasons WCA members might consider attending the annual CAA conference (to be held in New York City next winter).

I want to start with sharing some basic information. CAA, which celebrated its centenary in 2011, is the biggest professional organization for artists, art historians, art educators, curators, gallery & museum directors, and a variety of other arts professionals. CAA serves as a concrete platform for the exchange of artistic, theoretical, and pedagogical ideas, and as a venue for stimulating intellectual curiosity, and discussing ethical issues in the arts. It is also a site for professional growth, development, and collaboration.

CAA's annual conference, held every February, represents the most visible work of the organization. This large-scale national conference boasts a wide variety of opportunities for everyone from graduate students to long-established arts professionals. Panels of conference presentations by artists and art historians, which always act as a mental stimulant for me, are only the tip of the iceberg. In future issues of WCA E-News, I'll be talking more about these opportunities as we count down to the conference.

## **Legacy Initiative**

The Sylvia Sleigh Legacy Campaign and Initiative facilitates donations and raises funds to ensure that women's art will be cataloged, collected and preserved in museums and institutions throughout the country.

The Legacy Initiative has six goals:

- 1. Educate women on the importance of their legacy and cataloging and archiving their work and their papers.
- 2. Facilitate the placement of women's art in museums and permanent collections.
- 3. Publish articles, essays and catalogs on women artists.
- 4. Continue to cultivate and grow current WCA's programs that focus on legacy.
- 5. Partner with and support other organizations that are working towards the same goals and mission of WCA.
- 6. Procure funding to meet these goals through development of WCA programs on fiscal receivership, sponsorship and planned giving.

This important initiative was made possible by the generous donations of the Estate of the late Sylvia Alloway (Sleigh). Sylvia Sleigh, an artist and life-long advocate for women in the arts, was selected to receive the WCA Lifetime Achievement Awards in 2011, but sadly passed away before receiving the award.

In 2007, in an interview with Brian Sherwin for Myartspace, Sylvia Sleigh was asked if gender equality issues in the mainstream art world, and the world in general, had changed for the better. Sylvia answered, "I do think things have improved for women in general...but it's very difficult in the art world for women to find a gallery." According to Sylvia, there is still more that needs to be done in order for men and women to be treated as equals in the art world."

In my last year as President of WCA, I worked closely with the executors of Sylvia's estate, Douglas John and Paula Ewin to begin to develop and facilitate the Legacy campaign. The first donation to WCA was Sylvia's piece, *Turkish Bath*. The funding is the foundation for the campaign and will be the impetus to encourage others to follow in her footsteps.

In partnering with the Women's Caucus for Art, Sylvia's legacy will ensure that the work continues, that women are exhibited and written into history.

WCA looks forward to partnering with other donors and arts institutions in expanding its Legacy Campaign and Initiative. In November 2011, we facilitated a donation of Sylvia Sleigh's piece to the permanent collection of the Mills College Art Museum, at a women's college in Oakland, California. *Lawrence and Susanna Delgado in an Interior*, 1968, will now be on view to be appreciated and studied by future generations of women art historians and artists.

The partnership will also allow the WCA to be more philanthropic and aid others in making sure that women's art is recognized and valued.

In January 2012, the donation of *Kim Hardiman Nukua, The Divine Women, 1984*, allowed WCA to support the work of both *Soho20Gallery* and *Masterpieces;* a lecture series by Dr. Janetta Rebold Benton. And in February, 2012, the donation of *Christine, 1969*, allowed WCA to support the *Art for Kids* program administered by the Claremont Rotary, which helps various local charities in Claremont, in eastern Los Angeles County, California.

These examples are only the beginning. In the next month the Legacy Campaign and Initiative will be working in partnership with Florissant Valley Contemporary Art Gallery to put on an exhibition and catalog featuring the work of Lifetime Achievement Honoree Beverly Buchanan. This exhibition will be the first showing of her work in St. Louis, Missouri.

Young Women's Caucus Chair Jaimianne Amicucci arrived just in time for our Michigan board meeting, fresh off the plane from her dream trip to Bhutan, Tibet and Ethiopia. How did this young, "starving student" pull off this exotic adventure?

Amicucci is pursuing her MFA in Curatorial Practices at Maryland College for the Arts. In Baltimore, while taking classes and volunteering for several non-profits, she became intrigued with the multi-ethnic refugee population in the city. Her Curatorial Practices thesis will be titled *Global* 

Perspectives, and the exhibition will present the artwork and narratives of international ceramic artisans from the Baltimore refugees' countries of origin. She will also be working with refugee teens, who will be creating ceramic artwork and act as docents for the exhibition. She envisions an engaging exhibition that represents the layered, intergenerational perspectives of the artisans and teens. As part of her research, Amicucci wanted take a first-hand look at the artwork being produced in the refugees' countries of origin.

Amicucci created a fundraising site on Indiegogo and used social networking to get the word out about her research project. Through persistence and heavy marketing, shei raised more than her goal of \$6,000 for her journey.
